A Letter from Library Director **Ellen Dolan**

As I sit down to write this letter I am feeling guite excited about a rather small benchmark we have reached in the library renovation and expansion project. Today I received the keys to our temporary library at 214 Lake St in Shrewsbury (just behind the main Glavin building.) I am thrilled at the prospect of bringing all our staff to visit the site later this week, to get their first glimpse of the building where we will be for the next two years. It's one of the first strides in the adventure ahead!

My exuberance for this first step might the summer months, and a couple appear inflated, as so many other exciting benchmarks are ahead, but I credit my excitement to memories of having used a "temporary library" as a child.

I grew up in Marlborough MA, where in 1967 an arsonist set a number of buildings afire. The Marlborough Public Library was one of his targets. I can still recall the horror of seeing my beloved library black and charred, in ruins. Within weeks however, library services were moved to a recently vacated former Post Office building just a few hundred yards away. I suspect I followed the changes more closely than most 8 year olds of that time. I was an ardent library fan by then, visiting every weekday during times a week during the school year. I was also familiar with the former post office building, as my father worked for the US Post Office.

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(My walks to the library frequently included detours into the back sorting areas of post office, so I could beg my father for a nickel to buy cotton candy at the corner drug store.) I was saddened by the burned library, but the move to the temporary library brought great excitement! I came to love the temporary location. The former post office building, with its impressive marble steps at the entrance, massive interior columns that were cool to the touch and the wide granite steps that led to the basement level where the story hours were held, all enrich my memory of that time. It was all good to this little library visitor!

I kept those memories close as we started planning for the temporary library. I wanted to be sure that the children who use our temporary library will be excited by what they find. I wanted them to have reasons to keep visiting; to keep reading, exploring and growing while the main building is worked on. Childhood is short. Our youngest visitors can't put their growth and development on hold while the construction project is going on for two years. To that end, we have given the highest priority to the children's room space in our temporary library. The majority of the juvenile collection will be available, as will the children's computers and a small play space. There will even be an outdoor courtyard for children and families. And we will maintain a robust children's programming schedule.

Adults and teens will surely find the basic library services they need, including generous collections of books, movies, games, magazines and more, enough public computers to meet basic demand, and friendly staff to assist them. Although there will be a slightly reduced programming schedule for teens and adults, programs will still go on, with some moved to alternate locations.

Today I have the key for the temporary library in hand, but we don't yet have the exact date for the move. We will know that in the coming weeks, as we assess the moving service bids and plans. Thus, we ask your patience as you peruse the offerings in this newsletter. For some events and programs, we are still planning the alternate locations. There is a chance that some dates or times might change from what's shown in this issue. Please confirm with library staff or on the library website at www.shrewsbury-ma/library to be sure you have the most current information.

We hope you will visit us at our temporary library; that all ages will enjoy the new space, and that children will find some additional delight and excitement! - ED

Incubator for Entrepreneurs

Shrewsbury Public Library is breaking new ground with plans to open the first ever FREE in-library startup incubator, aimed at supporting local businesses and entrepreneurs as they jump-start their companies. In partnership with Krosslink.org, a foundation created and supported by a group of entrepreneurs and business leaders who have successfully launched and built companies of their own, Shrewsbury Public Library will lead the charge in Krosslink's mission to enlist 10,000 public libraries across the country to become partners in the incubator program by 2025. The partnership will provide a "start-up shell" for local resident entrepreneurs to hatch their ideas, hold meetings and network with other entrepreneurs - with no strings attached. The library will be launching the program with an introductory session on Thursday, November 13th, 6:30 - 8:00 PM at the temporary site.
