
## The Shrewsbury Public Library



### From the Director:

Dear Readers,


Many years ago while searching through some old records of the library at which I used to work, I encountered an interesting news clipping. The article described how during "The Great War" (WWI) the library had served as a Red Cross bandage making center. I was impressed by the idea of the library stepping into a nontraditional library role during a time of community need.

With dismal news on the economy, recent reductions in state funding, and so many people struggling with personal budgets, I started thinking back to that example from my earlier library. Specifically, I wondered, what role can the library play in helping the community and its citizens? My staff and I are aware that many library users have discovered the ways that the library can help in tight times. We've had many people tell us they are borrowing books from libraries instead of purchasing personal copies. We hear from patrons that they are using library computers to conduct job searches. We know that individuals and families are borrowing library movies and games instead of renting elsewhere. Our statistics show growing numbers of students using the library's free online tutoring service as a viable no cost alternative to private tutoring. We see visitors spending more time at the library, taking the opportunity to turn down home thermostats for a few hours. We've also heard stories of people scaling back personal newspaper and magazine subscriptions, and using the library's collection instead. This summer especially, we witnessed growth in use of our museum passes, participation in our summer reading programs, and attendance at cultural and entertainment programs. Many patrons have said they were forgoing trips and were instead taking advantage of library programs. Just this past week, Head of Circulation Services Nancy Colby commented on the growing number of new library cards we've issued.

While these services are helpful, the times call for a more focused or proactive approach. We could focus some of our programming on topics that will help people save money, develop new skills or make sound personal finance choices. We could highlight our print and electronic resources that teach do-it-yourselfers how to handle basic home repairs. We could be sure that our programming offers information and entertainment for all ages. Essentially, we could develop a sort of lyceum for people facing the lagging economy, a sort of "Budget Band-Aid." I discussed this idea with our Assistant Director George Brown who manages adult programming. He liked the idea and thought the Adult Services Advisory Group (a volunteer group that plans adult programming) would likely be interested.

Because we plan our newsletter months in advance, early promotion of such a series would be limited. The programs listed in this newsletter were developed before the extreme economic downturn, before this Budget Band-Aid series idea was considered. That shouldn't stop us from trying. Surely, we can start some of the programs this season. The other challenge we face is that recent budget cuts, which I described in the last issue, have reduced our resources. Therefore, I ask you to consider any ideas or skills you could contribute to a program or event for our series. Maybe you could help with a program on developing a personal budget, or offer a class on creating inexpensive meals for families.


